

## Mining lease objections review **SUMMARY PAPER 2**

# Participation

Most of the minerals are owned by the Queensland Government. So, anyone who wants to start mining has to get permission from the Government. This paper explains how people or groups can talk to the Government about any **Omining proposal** for a large-scale mining project now: why they think it is a good idea or why they don't think it is a good idea, or what parts need to be changed.

Then the paper explains ideas for changing how people can talk to the Government about these things. And it asks questions about those ideas for changes.



#### Before a miner gets permission to mine

Before a miner gets permission to mine, they usually get permission to explore the area.

Then, to get a **Imining lease** they must show the Government several things, such as:

- the area they want to mine has minerals in the ground
- the mining they want to do will be done properly
- the minerals they get will be used properly.

As part of the permission to mine, the miner needs a permit called an **Denvironmental authority**. This means the Government says it is OK

about how the miner plans to do the right thing about the environment. Before they get this OK, often the miner needs to get an

ienvironmental impact statement.

An ienvironmental impact statement is a report that gives information about the good and bad things that can come from their mining to the environment, the people or the economy.

Some of the details the miner needs to give are about:

- the environment in the area they want to mine
- how they will try to stop the mining from hurting the environment, the people or the **ieconomy**

When you see a word with i, you can read where we explain it: on the paper called 'What do these words mean?'



- how they will make these problems smaller, if they can't stop them
- how they will fix anything bad, if it happens
- how they will make up for anything bad, after it happens.

After they explain all of these things to the Government, they might get the **i**environmental authority. If they don't get this, the mine doesn't go ahead.

### Feedback from Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples and their communities is important

It is unusual for the Government to get written **Dobjections** from Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples and their communities about **Omining** proposals.

We want to make it easier for people to tell the Government what they think about **Omining proposals**.

It is very important that Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples can get their ideas to the Government before it decides.

### Objecting to a mining proposal: how does it work NOW?

Before the Government gives permission to mine, any person or group of people can tell the Government what they think about the **Omining proposal**.

Step 1: You send your **Oobjection** or submission to the Government

Any person or group can do one or more of these 3 things:

- Write to the Government about why you think the miner's **Denvironmental impact statement** needs some changes. What you write is called a **Dsubmission**.
- Write to the Government about why you think it is not OK for the miner to get permission for their **Omining** lease, or what changes the miner needs to make.
   What you write is called an **Oobjection**.
- Write to the Government about why you think there are problems or things that need to change, before

the Government decides to say OK to this miner's plans about looking after the environment. What you write is sometimes called a **Osubmission** and sometimes called an **Oobjection**. The Government's OK is called the **Oenvironmental authority**.

Step 2: The Government tells the Land Court about your **Oobjection** 

Step 3: The Land Court has a hearing about the 
Omining proposal and any Oobjections

If you made an **Dobjection**, you can choose to go to the Land Court and tell them what you think about the miner's plan.

# We want to hear from you

### Changing it to make it work better?

We want to suggest changes to how people can tell the Government what they think about **Omining proposals**.

The **Oprocesses** must make sure that everyone is treated fairly, and that changes make things better.

These are 3 of the main things that might need to change:

- leaving the court out of the **Oprocess** before the Government decides
- getting new ways that people can hear about what the miner wants to do, and then give their ideas before the Government decides. These new ways will be better if they are not organised as arguments between 2 sides. People must be able to explain their ideas and listen to other ideas in a positive way
- setting up an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Advisory Committee to tell the Government what they think about some **Omining proposals**.

# A Government internet site

It might be good if the Government sets up an internet site, where:

- people can sign up to get notices about mining in their area or on their Country
- it gives up-to-date information about **Omining** proposals
- all the information is together so that anyone can find out what they want to know on just one internet site.
